Construction Update

For each day worked, visible progress is made onsite. In just over two years since construction efforts began, more than ten million man hours without a lost-time incident have been worked to get the project to the half way point.

Construction continues on foundations, structural steel and equipment placement, welding, and installing underground/above ground piping and electrical work. Approximately 5,500 employees are working staggered shifts (6:00am-4:30pm and 7:30am-6:00pm) to help reduce traffic and the overall impact on the surrounding communities.

"With a project of this magnitude, there is no way of getting around an impact on the community," said Farid Bogani, Chief Engineering & Construction Officer. "However, we take our responsibility of being a good neighbor seriously, and we work closely with our contractor, CCJV,

to implement measures to help reduce the impact of traffic, road debris, and lighting due to increased night shifts."

CCJV is transporting the majority of workers to the site using 83 buses. Carpools are required for those with permits to park on site. A new park and ride lot in Hackberry was recently approved, and additional lots are under review. Cameron LNG is also awaiting Army Corps of Engineers approval to install turn lanes adjacent to the facility. Bogani said these measures should help in reducing traffic delays on Hwy 27.

Cameron LNG also cares about the health and safety of our workers. When summer temperatures reached the high 90's, CLNG installed ten cooling stations on site to allow workers to cool down and rehydrate. Grounded shelters are in place to provide safe harbor from lightning strikes in the event of

thunderstorms that frequently occur this time of year.

Visible signs of project progress include:

- Construction of the new control, administration & warehouse facility behind the existing terminal building
- Large equipment and fire water piping installation on Trains 1 & 2
- Piling, foundation and civil work on Train 3.
- Delivery of major equipment to site via roadways and barges from the Ports of Houston and Lake Charles

After two years of construction activity, Bogani reports the project remains in compliance with all environmental and engineering conditions required by FERC's June 2014 Order.

Eyes and Ears in the Community

In 2006, Cameron LNG established a seven-member Community Advisory Committee (CAC) of residents from across Cameron Parish to advise Cameron LNG management about how to enhance and maintain its positive relationship within the community. Ten years later, the CAC still meets regularly to receive updates on the liquefaction project and provide community input.

"The CAC members are our eyes and ears in the community," said Stevie Trahan, External Affairs Manager and a charter CAC member prior to employment by CLNG.
